Mission and Vision

- A network of local organizations dedicated to helping people in the Henry's Fork area conserve their rural landscapes, rural lifestyles, and unique natural resources.



Key Program Areas

- Provide landowners with resources and financial incentives to protect working farms and ranches and the fish and wildlife they sustain.
- Help people conserve wildlife and reduce human/wildlife conflicts.
- Provide information and tools to help the community guide new growth and development.



History





History

- 2006-2007 Forest Supervisor initiated HFLP to encourage conservation through a collaborative network of NGOs and agencies.
- Modeled after Blackfoot Challenge.
- Focus in the beginning was land conservation.



History, continued

- Identified target areas for conservation through a compilation of data from a variety of organizations
- 2009 expanded scope to include living with wildlife activities and land and natural resource planning.
- 2011 created communications materials (power point, pamphlet, map, photo library).



History, continued

- 2013 three committees were created representing the three legs of the “HFLP Stool” – *Land Conservation*, *Living with Wildlife* and *Land Use and Public Land Management*.
- 2013 – 2015 HFLP continued periodic meetings, communications outreach (articles in Island Park News, created HFLP website), and joint projects.



History, continued

- 2016 Identified ITD Highway 20 redesign project as a new focus for the group.
- Continues to meet periodically to share information on the current activities of all the member groups.



What Makes a Conservation Activity an HFLP Project?

- When more than one HFLP partner collaborates to accomplish a conservation goal.
- The project meets the mission of the HFLP and has a strategic and longer, landscape-scale perspective.
- It is a forum where big picture, broader scale projects can grow. The activity creates a better understanding of how properties and projects fit into the larger landscape.
