River Resources Field-work Intern

Organization: Henry's Fork Foundation

Location: Ashton, Idaho

Job Type: Internship (Summer 2018)

Duration: June 4 through August 10 (10 weeks)

Job Summary: The Henry's Fork Foundation (HFF) is currently accepting applications from undergraduate students interested in working in active grass-roots conservation with a nonprofit organization in the Greater Yellowstone Area. Selected intern will participate in all sectors of nonprofit work during the internship period but will primarily be assigned to data collection activities out on the river.

Organization Overview: The Henry's Fork Foundation is a nonprofit organization that works to conserve, protect, and preserve the unique fisheries, wildlife, and aesthetics of the Henry's Fork Watershed. HFF uses a collaborative, science-based approach to achieve its mission and works closely with water users, hydroelectric power companies, government agencies, and other nonprofit groups.

Project Description:

Primary project—Economic value of recreation use on the Teton River

The intern will spend several full days each week collecting data on recreational use of the Teton River as part of a three-year project being conducted by HFF, Friends of the Teton River (FTR), Idaho Department of Fish and Game, and Weber State University. Tasks associated with this project include counting recreational users at river access sites, distributing an economic-value survey instrument to river users, entering data, and tracking survey return rate. The intern will primarily work alone on these tasks, and considerable driving will be involved in the workday.

Other tasks, performed with other interns and staff from HFF or FTR, could include:

- 1. Fish Ladder Monitoring:** Interns will work to monitor fish moving upstream through the Buffalo fish ladder during the month of June. Interns will work alongside HFF in trapping fish, identifying all fish to species, checking for PIT tags, and recording fish length. Interns will also monitor and maintain the Chester fish ladder from June through August.
- 2. Water Quality and Streamflow Monitoring:** Throughout the summer interns will collect water samples and assist with installation and maintenance of automated water-quality monitoring instruments. Interns may also assist HFF and FTR staff with streamflow measurement.
- 3. Fish Population Monitoring:** Assist FTR with long-term monitoring of native cutthroat trout populations in the Teton River watershed.
- 4. Outreach/Education:** All interns will contribute to the HFF internship blog where they will provide a weekly update on their work to our membership. Interns are also highly encouraged to participate in various outreach events with HFF members, fly-fishing outfitters and guides, and other river stakeholders throughout the summer.
- 5. Henry's Fork Days:** Interns will work alongside HFF staff to help prepare for and participate in HFF's largest summer fundraising event, which is scheduled for June 15-16. **This event is mandatory.**

Qualifications: We are seeking motivated students who are interested in learning about watershed conservation from the perspective of nonprofit organizations. Students should have an interest/focus in the environmental sciences and the outdoors, have good communication skills, be able to work both independently and with others, be physically able to work outside and on the river, and be flexible to work on an array of various projects. Students must also be able to swim and have a valid driver's license.

Logistics: The selected intern will receive a 10-week stipend directly from Colgate University, through a fund established specifically to support this internship with HFF. The intern is responsible for travel to and from HFF's campus in Ashton. HFF will provide dormitory-style housing at its campus at no cost to the intern. HFF will also provide company vehicles for work-related travel, but the intern is responsible for local transportation during off-work hours.
