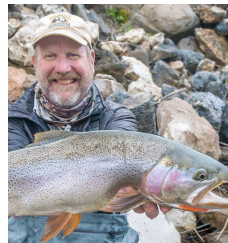

Member Profile: Cliff Nowell and Laura Anderson



Cliff was first introduced to the Henry's Fork as a teenager while working in Jackson, Wyoming in 1975. At that time, Cliff joined a group of workers for a day of fishing on the Henry's Fork. Cliff remembers getting out at the log jam and watching a person land a very large, very beautiful trout, and has been a fan ever since.

The first time Laura experienced the Henry's Fork was in the summer of 1985 while she was a student at the University of Wyoming. While Cliff fished, Laura and a

friend hiked the trails in Harriman Park. Laura's memory is of the flowers, green grass, and beautiful vistas.

Cliff and Laura have both recently retired from rewarding careers at Weber State University in Ogden, Utah. Laura taught computer software for 27 years. Long-term Aquatic Insect Monitoring Continues on the Henry's Fork and South Fork

Many of us can recall epic hatches on Idaho waters where insects covered the river, and maybe our car, like a carpet. Other than being an otherworldly sight, aquatic macroinvertebrates (aquatic insects) feed trout, are the basis of fly-fishing on the Henry's Fork and South Fork, and are important indicators of aquatic habitat quality. In the sixth year of a long-term program to monitor aquatic macroinvertebrates on the Henry's Fork, we also celebrated the second year of annual monitoring on the South Fork. On a cold February day, HFF sampled three sites on the South Fork—upper, canyon, and lower South Fork—to assess aquatic insect populations. Henry's Fork sampling at Flatrock, Last Chance, Osborne Bridge, Ashton, and St. Anthony occurs every year around St. Patrick's Day, but this year, the COVID-19 pandemic meant a scaled back Henry's Fork sample. HFF, using appropriate health and

safety precautions, was able to sample Flat Rock, Last Chance, and Osborne in mid-March. Due to the long-term nature of this effort, it was important that HFF collect the samples and store them until it is possible to have them processed. Results from this year's monitoring will be shared as soon as the data is available.

The South Fork Joins HFF's Water Quality Monitoring Sonde Network



Monitoring water quality continues to be a cornerstone of HFF's science and technology program thanks to the capacity it provides to monitor and influence potential impacts to the river and track changes in river health over time. When the South Fork Initiative was launched in 2018, one of the first projects on the wish list was bringing water

quality monitoring capacity to the South Fork Watershed.

As of now, two water quality monitoring sondes (in-river instruments) have been launched in the South Fork — lower and upper South Fork—with a third scheduled to be installed soon. The first sonde is already connected and transmitting data live to HFF's data website. The remote transmission technology for the remaining two sondes will be installed in the coming weeks to connect them to the larger network. HFF Receives Competitive Federal Grant for Work with Irrigation District

HFF was honored this year to receive \$273,211 from the US Bureau of Reclamation WaterSMART Applied Science Grant program for predictive water management efforts in partnership with the Fremont-Madison Irrigation District (FMID). With 19 recipients across the West, only two in Idaho, and seven of the 19 awarded to research universities, HFF is truly in good company.

In these predictive water management efforts, HFF is partnering with FMID to develop hydrologic models and a web-based platform to improve access to hydrologic information. This will provide modeling tools and hydrologic data to enhance water management efforts, including demand-reduction and increasing reservoir carryover. This effort will complement a whole host of other programs, including the Upper Snake River Collaborative

Farms & Fish Program (a collaboration with Friends of the Teton River, Trout Unlimited, and the Nature Conservancy), where we continue to work with farmers, on the ground, to reduce irrigation demand and conserve water. Thank you for your investment in these programs and thank you to FMID, the Idaho Department of Water Resources, and local farmers and irrigators for their willingness to get to know us and work with us on innovative projects to improve our water resources.

Predictions for Summer 2020 and the Importance of Keeping a Full Reservoir

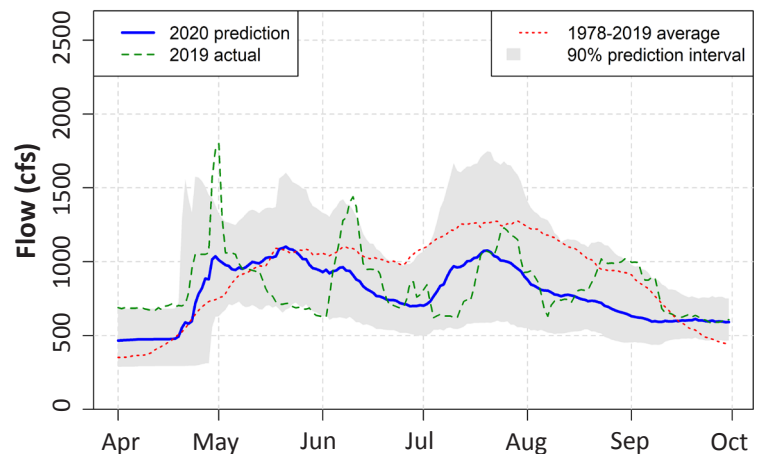
As HFF's scientific understanding and capacity to conserve our rivers and fisheries increases year after year, we are able to prioritize the programs that will have the greatest positive impact on wild trout. One of these programs is Dr. Rob Van Kirk's analysis and modeling of water data, and our ability to share that data with water management decision-makers. Our efforts and partnerships have resulted in increased reservoir carryover, which brings with it a whole host of benefits from increased winter flows and trout recruitment to better summer fishing conditions. As is tradition this time of year, we would like to share some of that data in the form of predictions for the upcoming fishing season, and a little more explanation on why we focus so much time and energy on Island Park Reservoir as the linchpin to healthy Henry's Fork fisheries from Mesa Falls to Big Springs.

- A wet, cold March improved watershed-wide snow water equivalent (SWE, how we assess snowpack) from 90 percent to 97 percent of average.
- As of April 1, natural flow in the Henry's Fork Watershed for April-September was expected to be 97 percent of average, compared with 99 percent of average in 2019 and 104 percent of average in 2018.
- However, precipitation in April was only 88 percent of average and high melt rates at the end of the month resulted in loss of all of the gains in SWE made during the first half of April.
- If the current weather forecast holds (warm, dry May),

and barring unforeseen summer rain, draft of Island Park Reservoir to meet downstream irrigation and streamflow needs will be higher than over the past three years. This highlights how a good or bad snowpack can be affected by snowmelt timing and spring and summer rains.

- As runoff recedes, streamflow at Island Park Dam will drop from about 950 cfs in the middle of May to 600 cfs by the end of June.
- At worst, draft of Island Park Reservoir will begin around June 20, but most likely not until around July 1, very near average, but 12 days earlier than in 2019.

- Barring extremely dry, warm weather late in the summer as happened in 2019, outflow from Island Park Reservoir during the summer is expected to

gradually decrease from around 1,200 cfs in early July to around 650 cfs in September. In the worst-case scenario, outflow could exceed 1,200 cfs from around July 5 to August 5.

- Island Park Reservoir carryover is expected to end up around 95,000 ac-ft (70 percent full), compared with 98,000 ac-ft in 2018 (73 percent full). For comparison, reservoir volume on September 30 was 15 percent full in 2016, 29 percent full in 2015, and 26 percent full in 2013.

Benefits of High Reservoir Levels

Winter outflow from Island Park Dam averaged 504 cfs in 2017-18, which led to strong recruitment in the spring of 2019 and the 4th highest trout population observed by Idaho Department of Fish and Game since record-keeping began in 1978. Winter flow was 560 cfs in 2018-2019 and 532 cfs in 2019-2020, which will lead to strong recruitment in 2020 and 2021. The past three winters have seen the highest winter flow in three consecutive years since 1998-2000. Based on current predictions, winter flow next year will be around 490 cfs, extending the streak of above-average winter flows to four years.

Since 2016, HFF's research and monitoring has documented many benefits of maintaining a high volume of water in Island Park Reservoir year-round. Including the long-recognized benefit to winter flows and trout recruitment, these include: cooler water released from the dam during the summer, better water clarity during the summer, optimal outflow from the dam (600-1,000 cfs)

between mid-June and late September, fewer cyanobacteria (aka "blue-green algae") blooms in the reservoir, and anecdotal evidence of increased runs of Rainbow Trout and Kokanee Salmon into the upper Henry's Fork from the reservoir (we are currently obtaining data on historic Kokanee Salmon counts to analyze this).

Because of these benefits, ensuring high levels in Island Park Reservoir continues to be the single-most important goal of HFF's work. To continue to achieve this we are:

- Refining predictive models so that water management strategies can be set to minimize excess delivery of water from the reservoir.
- Partnering with irrigators to install modern, more precise diversion and water delivery infrastructure.
- Working one-on-one with farmers to reduce demand for mid-summer irrigation.
- Promoting managed aquifer recharge when and where it will provide increased streamflow to the lower watershed during the summer.
- Conducting PhD-level research to determine when outflow from Island Park Reservoir can be reduced in late summer without negative impacts on the lower Henry's Fork fishery.

All of this work is aimed at reducing the draft of Island Park Reservoir to meet irrigation demand, and we are already seeing the benefits of these efforts. First, slightly better than average water supply in 2012 left the reservoir at its long-term average of 43 percent full. However, with a nearly identical water supply in 2018, Rob's daily water reports helped facilitate more precise water management decisions and the reservoir ended the water year at 72 percent full, a savings of 41,900 acre-feet. Then, when looking at the top-five three-year sequences of Island Park Reservoir carryover since 1978, 2017-2019 ranked fourth place with a water supply that was only 105 percent of average, compared with 120-135 percent of average supply the last time the reservoir was this full, back in the 1990s.

From 4th highest Box Canyon trout population to stories of some of the best upper river fishing in decades, keeping the reservoir more consistently full than it has been in 20 years is having very positive impacts. 🐟



Together, We are the Voice of the River

HFF continues to serve in its role of Voice of the River in administrative, legal, and permitting processes that could impact the health of the river. In recent months that has included commenting on stream alteration permits, investigating construction near the river at St. Anthony and Mack's Inn, and resolving an access concern at Ora Bridge.



Concerned citizens reported construction at Mack's Inn to HFF and the Forest Service on April 8th. HFF had reviewed an application by the developer to install a storm water retention system at the new Marriott, which would improve the current situation of storm water runoff across the dirt lot into the river. However, due to a misunderstanding by a local consultant, the developer had not yet received the permit.



The Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR) instructed them to cease work and fencing was installed to protect the river as of April 10th. HFF will continue to monitor water quality and the permitting process to ensure proper procedures are followed.

Thank you to the concerned citizens and the Forest Service for bringing this to our attention, and to IDWR for their quick response.

Did You Know?

March brought snow water equivalent (SWE) up to 97 percent of average, after spending most of the winter down at 90 percent of average.

A managed freshet from April 29 - May 4 moved 55 tons of fine sediment out of the Harriman-Pinehaven reach.

HFF's Idaho law extern, Matthew Ryan, spent the spring semester researching legal processes that affect management of the Henry's Fork.

The old Ora Bridge will be closed from April 28 - June 30, 2020 for construction of the roadway up to the new bridge.
